'Ah'm no making a dress, I widnae wear it anyway"..... she was worried that her parents did not have the money to buy the material. Her mother did scrimp and save in order to get the money to buy material, the cheapest she could find. When it came time to try the dress on to have it hemmed my friend responded: 'Ah'm no wanting a hem, Ah'm no gonnae wear it anyway.'

The truth..... she didn't want anyone to see her worn out underwear.

Telling me this story my friend expressed how she felt inside, it wasn't that she didn't want to make a dress, but she was trying, in the only way she knew, to cover up the poverty in which she lived.

Every day we encounter others whose lives are different from our own, let us not be impatient with one another, but let us show love and compassion. Let us take time 'to examine the road over which the fault has passed'.

Our children in Belarus all had a large food parcel delivered to them at Christmas. Some families are doing better than others but that is normal. All our children are in good health despite

the very cold and snowy winter weather.

I will be travelling to Belarus for a week in April with Bob Pattison and another host parent, mostly paying our own way to go. We will be taking further food parcels/essentials when we meet with all of the existing children in their own homes and we will also meet the 5 new children who will be coming to Scotland for the first time. This year we will have 15 returning children and 5 new children taking our group to 20. The children will be here in our halls from 1st to 29th June

We have already started preparing our programme and provisions for the trip to Belarus and also for the whole month of June when the children are here..

Please pray for us we go on our annual trip to Belarus from 12-19 April. Pray that we are kept safe from the many dangers we will face as we go about our work. Pray that we will be able to do all that we set out to do in bringing aid and love to the children. Pray that we can worship safely in Mogilev Baptist church when we are there. Pray that the children and their families will feel the hand of God on their lives through the work that we do.

The Return of Wee Dennis

(Now - just Dennis)

All of the children are special to us but Wee Dennis has a very special place in our hearts. He is probably the most troubled but most loving boy we have had in our group.




Up until the age of 4 Dennis was "looked after" by his alcoholic parents who locked him in a cupboard for long periods of time with little or no food, while they were drunk. As a result Dennis is a very small boy. He ended up in an orphanage and was taken out of there by various quardians but was returned after a few days or a few weeks as he was too hard work. He was also admitted to a mental hospital for a few weeks, which is understandable, given what he had been through. 3 years ago he was taken out of the orphanage by his current quardian and he has remained with her since then. He came to Scotland with our 2011 group. A more loving boy you will not meet. He just wants to cuddle everybody and be their friend. However his behaviour within the group was not great at times and it was a similar story for his host parents at that time - Tom and Katie. He was taken out of the house for 2 nights to stay with the interpreters and while that helped a little he was soon back to his misbehaving ways. Despite the misbehaviour we all made allowances for him, because of his past and loved him very much. In March 2012 on the visit to Belarus I was given an update on his behaviour which was not good, including him attending a special school. Despite our love for him we were not equipped to cope with his deteriorating behaviour so I made the decision that he would not be invited in 2012. I have huge admiration for his quardian, who is a very special lady. She has had him for over 3 years when others only lasted days. She told me that many times during that period his bags were packed but in the end she could not send him back to the orphanage.

I promised her that we would not forget Dennis and he would stay on the programme for the remainder of the 5 years even if he wasn't to return to Scotland. We would support them with food parcels, vitamins, clothes etc and if his behaviour ever improved I would consider a return. When the children returned to Belarus in June 2012 we sent home a full suitcase of clothes etc for Wee Dennis. When Clare visited Wee Dennis during the October 2012 trip she was amazed at the difference in him both at the party and in his house. A much quieter, more contented boy and nothing seemed to bother him including the younger ones hitting him with balloons. His guardian confirmed that he is a changed boy.

We have agreed that Wee Dennis will return to Scotland in June 2013 where he will be known as Dennis (as Big Dennis is no longer coming!) and will be hosted by Bob and Lilian Pattison, so we will see a lot of him at the church. etc I am not saying he will be an angel but Dennis wouldn't be Dennis without a nice mixture of love and wee bit of devilment. Thank you to Lilian and Bob for taking on Dennis so willingly. Dennis is 9 now and will have his 10th birthday on 19th June during the visit.

In my view it is very important that we give Dennis and his guardian as much support as possible as Dennis needs the stability in his life provided by his guardian and the consequences of him going back to an orphanage are unthinkable. Dennis was told at Christmas that he was returning to Scotland and both he and his guardian are delighted. His guardian tells us that his behaviour has been so good and he has

been determined to get back to Scotland.
Sometimes you have to be cruel to be kind and missing out on the 2012 trip might have been a cruel decision for us to take but it looks like we have helped to turn a young life around. Its great to be a positive influence on someones life and I am sure this could be said of all 20 children in our group.
